Course Overview:

Equip participants with essential knowledge and skills to address various prehospital medical emergencies. The training blends theoretical knowledge with hands-on practical exercises to ensure optimal understanding and skill retention.

Course Breakdown:

Module 1: Introduction to Prehospital Care

- > The importance of prehospital emergency medical care
- Role of a first responder
- Scene safety and Assessment

Module 2: Basic Life Support (BLS)

- Principles of BLS
- Heart attack v/s Cardiac arrest
- > Hands-on training: CPR for adults, children, and infants
- Use of Automated External Defibrillator (AED)
- ➤ Safe and careful transfer.

Module 3: Choking

- Recognizing choking
- Heimlich maneuver for adults and children
- First aid for infants

Module 4: Neurological Emergencies

- Recognizing signs of a stroke
- > Importance of prompt medical attention.
- ► FAST
- Transient Ischemic Attack (TIA)
- > Silent stroke/ Asymptomatic Cerebral Infarction.
- Severe headache and related problems.
- Immediate care to reduce brain damage.
- Seizures, febrile seizures

Module 5: Fainting (Syncope)/shock

- ➢ First aid for fainting
- ➢ Exercise Associated Collapse.
- Low blood sodium

Module 6: Water-related Emergencies

- Drowning: Signs, rescue, and first aid
- > Watersports, importance of disciplined safety consciousness
- Handling hypothermia

Module 7: Electrical and Environmental Hazards

- Electrocution: Immediate care and safety
- Lightning strike: Signs and first aid
- Fire hazards: Safety, burns, and treatment
- Heat exhaustion, heat stroke.

Module 8: Animal-Related Emergencies

- Snake bites: Identification, first aid, and DOs & DON'Ts
- > Rabid dog bites: Immediate care and post-exposure prophylaxis
- Stings and bites from insects etc.

Module 9: Musculoskeletal Injuries

- Sprains, strains, and fractures
- Splinting and immobilization techniques
- Safe transport.

Module 10: Road Accidents

- Scene assessment and safety
- > Basic first aid for bleeding, wounds, and head injuries
- Safe transfer methods

Module 11: Food Poisoning and Digestive Emergencies

- Recognizing signs of food poisoning
- First aid and when to seek medical assistance

Module 12: Special Populations & Considerations

- Pregnant victims, elderly, and children
- Cultural and situational awareness
- > Some guidelines on medical emergencies in disaster management activities.

Module 13: Simulation and Scenario-based Training

Realistic scenarios to apply learned skills

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Attendance will be marked at the beginning and end of each session.
- 2. There will be a written examination, practical and viva –voce at the end of the course. A minimum of 75% attendance is required for the candidate to be eligible to appear for the exam.
